NEW PRINCIPAL NELSON CONCERNED; SOUTH STUDENTS NEED TECHNOLOGY TRAINING

Linda Nelson, South High's new principal, enjoyed the Golf Tournament dinner with SHF golfing stalwarts on June 30. In conversation, Principal Nelson expressed deep concern regarding the technology and computer training needs of South High students.

"Well-equipped labs will give our students an edge."

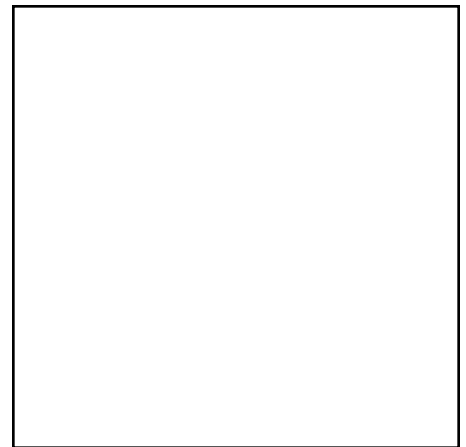
In all corners of the school, South is sorely lacking in computer technology. For example, the school's third-floor computer lab

room has been idle for three years because it is not equipped with computers and software. The good news is that the Minneapolis School System has installed the infrastructure, electricity, and furniture. However, it is up to each school to obtain the actual hardware. At this time budget restraints keep the South administration from purchasing computers, printers and software for the third-floor computer lab. The cost of this lab

alone would come to \$38,000.

How would students benefit from the activation of the computer lab? Principal Nelson reports that there are foreign language and science curriculum plans in place that include the use of computer programs. Mr. Delaney, science teacher, said, "keep in mind, use of computers for instruction addresses the learning style of many struggling students. Also, this gives the instructors an awesome teaching tool. Well-equipped labs will give our students an edge, an edge they will need in this technology age."

At the June 13 meeting, the South High Foundation board approved exploring a technology fund drive for the students of South High. The Finance committee and the Long Range Planning Committee are working out the details of this fund drive, if you would like to contribute to the technology fund at this time, you can write "technology" on your check.

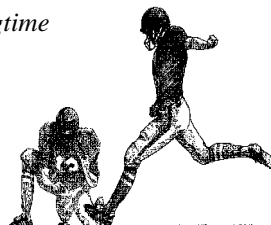

SOUTH HIGH GRAD, RACHAEL LEIGH COOK SHINES IN HOLLYWOOD

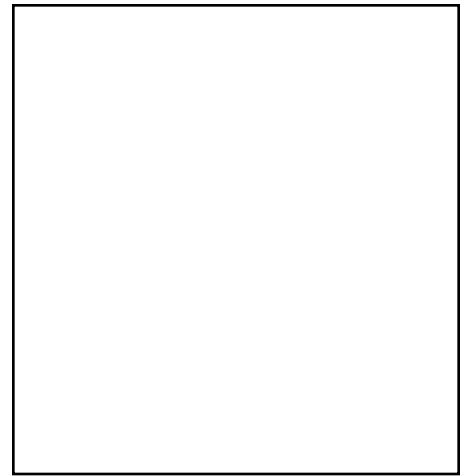

There is another star shining from the South. Rachael Leigh Cook '98 has done what many people struggle to do: make it in the film industry. She appeared in her first role at age 14, an 11-minute film titled *26 Summer Street*. It was shown at the 1997 Minneapolis/St. Paul International Film Festival.

Since then she has had the opportunity to work with a variety of film's best known names—Danny DeVito, Holly Hunter and Kevin Costner—in 15 films, including last summer's hit *She's All That*, with Freddie Prinze Jr. Add to that six films that are being released or produced this year for an impressive resume.

Perhaps what is an even greater measure of Cook's success is the fact that she remains grounded in reality. She recognizes that being an actress is a job that she is fortunate to enjoy doing, but—like any job—has a downside as well.

The biggest challenge may be the distance from her family (they live in Minnesota and she lives in Los Angeles), although she tries to visit often. It is plain to see how important they are to her when she shares with Minnesota Monthly writer Jacquelyn Fletcher, her vision of the future: "When I am 85 I want to be able to say I led an honest and respectable life, that I was a good sister and daughter, and that I always gave my all." THE ROTARY CLUB OF MINNEAPOLIS SALUTES WINSTON WALLIN WITH SERVICE ABOVE SELF AWARD

Winston Wallin '43, successful business and community leader, exemplifies the high ideals and values of Minneapolis Rotary's annual Service Above Self Award. The Rotary Club presented Mr. Wallin with this award at a luncheon on June 2.

Mr. Wallin's community accomplishments reflect his dedication to education. He served as advisor to the president of the U of M, as a director of the U of M

Foundation and as chair of the board of trustees at Carleton College.

He also has been a leader in creative giving circles, having established the Wallin Foundation, which allocates gifts to educational, cultural and social causes, and the Wallin Scholarships Program for Minneapolis High School Graduating Seniors, which started at his alma mater, South High, eight years ago and will grant 275 scholarships this year alone.

HEGGENHAUGEN ESTATE BENEFITS U OF M

Kenneth and Helen Heggenhaugen both grew up in south Minneapolis. He sat behind her at South High School (her maiden name was Heggen), but they didn't become more than acquaintances until they were students at the U of M in the mid-1920s. Helen was raising money for the Memorial Stadium fund drive and persuaded Kenneth to donate \$10.

Helen earned her bachelor's and master's degrees and then taught at South High for three decades. Kenneth earned his degree in 1931 and worked for the State of

Minnesota in various agencies. Throughout their lives and marriage they have been strong advocates of education.

Their passion for the University is due in part to Dr. Raymond Scallen, a 1952 graduate of the U of M and whom the Heggenhaugens claim saved Kenneth's life when he was dying of a heart condition. They decided to commit \$1 million of their estate to the U of M, to be recognized in the Kenneth B. and Helen E. Heggenhaugen Conference Center inside the McNamara Alumni Center. According to their wishes, the remainder of their estate will be used to set up an endowment fund to benefit medical students, research, and education.

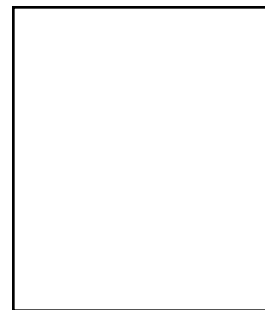
